Jewish Interpretation. In ancient Judaism there were basically three approaches to the interpretation of the Bible, associated with different groups of teachers: (1) The Palestinian-Babylonian school associated with the Pharisees; (2) the allegorizing Hellenistic school as represented by Philo; and (3) the sectarian and prophecy-oriented school associated with Qumran and the Essenes.

"Pardes" refers to approaches to biblical exegesis in rabbinic Judaism or to interpretation of text in Torah study. The term, sometimes also spelled PaRDeS, is an acronym formed from the same initials of the following four approaches: Peshat - "surface" or the literal meaning. Remez - "hints" or the deep meaning beyond just the literal sense. Derash - from Hebrew darash: "inquire" - the comparative meaning, as given through similar occurrences. Among the institutions founded beyond any single denomination was the Jewish Publication Society (JPS), headquartered in Philadelphia. At a time when Jewish biblical scholarship and interpretation were not highly regarded in academic circles, avenues for publishing Jewish works were similarly constrained. To fill this gap, the JPS was organized.

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
